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WHAT IS A COMBAT CONTROLLER?

Air Force Combat Controllers (CCTs) are some of the most highly trained, special operations forces in the world. Trained as elite air traffic controllers, their unique skill sets make them the deadliest warriors on the planet. They specialize in controlling airspace in combat and austere environments, calling in precision air strikes and delivering humanitarian support around the world as the first, "first responders" to arrive during a disaster.

There are approximately 600 active Combat Controllers in the Air Force, making them much smaller than their better-known counterparts. Their training consistently washes out more than 80% of the men seeking to wear the scarlet beret. And their training pipeline is longer, more demanding and costlier than that to become a Navy SEAL or Army Green Beret. Some of the military's most

difficult missions have been and continue to be executed by Combat Controllers who operate in remote or hostile environments. Acting as a lone operator who is attached other special operations forces, their certifications include open and closed circuit combat diving, military free fall (HALO) and staticline parachuting, unconventional vehicle insertion such as motorcycle/ATV and snowmobile, and fastrope.

Each CCT is also a certified USAF air traffic controller, so that they can more effectively establish control of all airspace and assets available to these unique operators and it is this that makes them truly, the most lethal individuals to walk a battlefield in the history of human warfare.

We are First There 4 Resiliency, Wellness, Education and Heritage support.



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


FIRST THERE 4 RESILIENCY

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


FIRST THERE 4 EDUCATION

After spending 30 years operating in some of the most austere environments and combat engagements in the world, retired Air Force Lt. Col. Dan Schilling is comfortable being uncomfortable. Schilling served as an Air Force Special Tactics Officer and, before that, a Combat Controller. He is dedicated to sharing the history of the world's deadliest and most humanitarian special operations force.

Schilling is the New York Times bestselling author of Alone at Dawn: Medal of Honor Recipient John Chapman and the Untold Story of the World's Deadliest Special Operations Force.

The book is the definitive chronicle of the legacy and impact of Air Force Combat Control and includes the story of MSgt. John Chapman, whose extraordinary heroism on a frigid mountainside in Afghanistan in 2002 resulted in his receiving the only Medal of Honor action ever captured on video and the first and only for the USAF since the Vietnam War.

Of his fellow CCTs Schilling says they are "the thinking man's special operator" and requires each Combat Controller to shoulder the burden of responsibility for the survival or death of every friend or enemy on the battlespace in which they operate. They must understand combat in four dimensions, tracking and coordinating every ground and air asset involved on their mission in order to call in air strikes on enemy forces, coordinate air assets for reconnaissance and intelligence gathering, all while maintaining communication with every ground and air asset.

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
